
## **Pilsdon Community Anniversary** Sunday 13th October 2013

#### **Biography: Rev. Dr. Tim Naish**

Immediately prior to joining the staff of Ripon College Cuddesdon, Oxford in 2006 Tim was Rector of Hanborough and Freeland in Oxford Diocese. Before that, with Hilary and their three children, he spent ten years in theological education with the Anglican Church in Africa (Zaire and Uganda), working through CMS. He has also spent a year in the Church of South India. His primary area of teaching and research is the theology and history of mission.

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#### **MICHAEL WRITES**

I am not sure any two summers are ever the same at Pilsdon. If memory serves, we had flooding last June and July and this year we have had more sunshine and heat than most can remember. This summer has proved to be mixed with different blessings. We have just experienced out first Pilsdon Art Exhibition at the Chapel in the Garden in Bridport. During the same period of time of preparing for the art show we experienced periods of water shortages due to the heat and the demand on our spring fed reservoir.

A water shortage at Pilsdon means a couple of things; water is transported for drinking from the one mains water feed we have, fewer showers are taken, laundry is suspended and gardens are watered just a bit less. gleaming, low mileage Peugeot was made and it has now joined the fleet in support of our ever busy community life.



These past few weeks have seen much scurrying/ sedate wistful wandering to and from garden to kitchen to freezer room with arm loads and basketfuls of produce. Our veg and fruit freezers are fast

filling up with succulent berries and rhubarb, broad beans and beetroots. The vegetable shed smells of home grown onions and garlic hanging above brown bag loads of earthy potatoes and freshly lifted carrots. Luscious salads of lettuce, cucumbers and some of Dorset's finest tasting tomatoes frequently grace our luncheon tables. Evening meals regularly consist solely of Pilsdon produce with our fresh herbs to garnish. Courgette loathers begin to tire of



This process of course involves much sweat and a few tears; as well as joy and satisfaction in seeing seeds reaching harvest and labouring together in the wonder of creation.



**OUT WITH THE OLD.....** 

One of our major fundraising efforts this year has been targeted at securing a replacement cooker and extractor unit for the kitchen. Cooking was becoming a bit of a lottery, with no guarantees the gas rings would light, or indeed whether the oven door would stay attached. Our extraction system had fallen behind the relevant health and safety requirements. So, in June, the old cooker left the kitchen for the last time — the only way out was through the window— and then the new one was installed, entering via the same route!

Within just a few hours the new cooker was whirring

and chocolate brownies and shortbread were being produced. It was a great community effort to manage the complicated logistics of window removal and replacement, re-tiling, heavy lifting and maneuvering, cleaning and painting. Huge thanks to everyone involved and to those who support Pilsdon who kindly made donations towards this vital piece of new equipment (for which the fundraising effort still continues....).

The newest arrival to our livestock cohort this year is Jasmine, a lovely heifer calf born to Snowdrop on a balmy evening in early August. As a first time mother she did very well, especially considering she was being watched by nearly the whole community who had gathered in support. We said a sad farewell to two of our Jersey cows, Hyacinth and Violet, who after years of sterling service and thousands of litres of milk retired to a family farm in Devon. July was both a blessing and a challenge. Lack of rain has meant little growth of grass, which in turn has meant a very careful rotation of our cattle and sheep around the limited pasture land. However the gathering and stacking of hay

The fact that hardly a drop of rain fell during the month of bales was a relatively stress free activity with the endless days of blue sky—we now have a satisfyingly full barn of hay. We also took delivery of 20 tons of logs, in readiness for sawing and splitting to feed the boiler for the east wing. So, whilst we are enjoying the warmest and driest summer in many years, we are also busy preparing for the change in season which lies just around the corner.
