

transformative ways through the pattern of our day to day lives; our worship and prayer at 4 distinct times throughout the day, and our ethic of work and hospitality.




# COMINGS, GOINGS AND TRANSITIONS

Welcome to Rachel who joined us in July as a volunteer. Rachel has travelled from Scotland to be with us and is fitting in well with the life of the community!












Jimmy Holden, a former volunteer in

# THE NGG (NEW GIGANTIC GREENHOUSE)

Some very kind people purchased a house in Beaminster which had an 8' x 14' Hartley Greenhouse occupying half of their garden and was of no use to them. With a visit to Pilsdon the deal was done and the greenhouse generously donated. After some construction work at Pilsdon; laying a new slab, relocating compost bins, and working around the muck pile, it has arrived and is a remarkable feature of the garden.

Once complete it will have its own water source and electrics which will power the heaters for germination and provide enough space for many projects at once.


# THE WARDEN WRITES...
