It has been a while since our last newsletter. We are not sure where the time has gone. Now is a good time for catch-up!


Our Christmas celebrations began, after a quiet Advent, with our Service of Carols and Lessons joined again this year by the Broadoak Choir. It was a wonderful

GETTING EXCITED ABOUT WASTE

This may be a topic that not many people will get excited about, but it is big news here and a great relief to many! After many years of cleaning, bailing and trying to maintain both the sewerage plant and the reed beds, we have finally come to a new and potent solution.



Hopefully, in the next 30 days we will have approval to go forward with our plans for the installation of a completely new sewerage system; a Klargester Bio-Disc System. This, along with the new and enlarged grease trap should set us free of the frequent and sometimes faulty system and smelly maintenance.

BAM, the international construction company that rebuilt the Looseboxes, has been instrumental in putting all the contractors together to come up with the proposal on our behalf, and CRASH, a building industry charity who also worked with us closely during the Loosebox Project, has provided us with a £30,000.00 grant for the sewerage project, along with working to get discounts on the needed materials.

The total cost of this project will be £53,287.30. We still have a gap of £23,287.30 to meet through seeking grants and asking for donations.

Each year we are faced with a fundraising target of £30,000.00-£40,000.00 in order to provide the community with gardens, animals, and a place for people to feel welcome and valued and nurtured, and to keep bursaries for our guests within their means.

REFLECTION OF A GUEST ...

I guess the first thing I want you to know is that I came to Pilsdon just before Christmas of 2013 as a 'wayfarer' looking for a safe place to stay for a few days until I figured out where I should go and whether I could count on any one to help me out. I was tired of sofa surfing. I had tried at different times to stop using drugs and alcohol but it never lasted for that a few weeks.

Now, I have never actually been clean in a real sense; it was just a matter of degree of use. At Pilsdon I had the stark awakening of what being drug and alcohol free meant and it was never my plan to be at Pilsdon for this long. I was only here for a few days to hide out from the world.

Then something changed. I got invited to stay through Christmas and the New Year and made an application to stay on as a residential guest. I still was not completely sold on the idea of Pilsdon, but it was working so far.

Not long into my stay at Pilsdon I got a call from my sister telling a good and long-time friend had died from a heroin overdose. This sent me into a real spin. It hit me very close to home. That could have been me and it changed my perspective of where I was right now and the choices I had to make. It was then that life at Pilsdon really changed for me.

Over the past 18 months life has been a very different experience for me. I found myself making the decision over and over again to try and to live into the life support Pilsdon gives. It has not always been easy. I have come up against some hard discussions with other guests and members. These have somehow led to better and deeper understanding of who I am as a

> person without drugs. This has also lead to better relationships with members of my own family.

> This experience has taught me to rely on others and to be accountable to others for my actions. But most importantly, I love Pilsdon and the people who come and go from here. We all seem to work

and laugh in a way unlike anywhere I have been. Soon I may find myself moving forward from Pilsdon, but will always somehow feel connected to this place.

During a recent discussion at our morning meeting in the community (a discussion that seems to repeat itself) we were talking about tasks and projects in the community and trying to prioritise what needed to be done as we moved from the cooler damper weather into the long and never

disappointing spring. The thing that reverberated in my mind was the thought 'there is no virtue in doing something hard just because it is hard.'

Now, every few years trimming the brambles back from the pasture fencing is hard work but important for maintaining the livestock and the fences. Tilling the soil and preparing for planting is hard work but the outcome at harvest is worth the effort! Keeping the community and its equipment in repair can be hard work and can be guite satisfying and cost effective.

But, sometimes we spend time doing things that, maybe, do not have the same value as caring for others or do not foster beauty and abundance or make existing things like new. Sometimes we do the same things over and over again, because the real work we need to do seems insurmountable to us or would take too much time or too much personal investment.

The harder work at Pilsdon is actually the work that can go unnoticed to a visitor or a casual observer. It is the hard and daily work of learning to walk alongside each other. It is the task of learning to share the work we would rather do alone (because we know how). The self-control of letting others try it their way and not your way. It is the silently covering for someone else bad day without asking to trade jobs.

Part of the life that the culture Pilsdon asks from each of us is not to be the expert at much but to be the apprentice at everything; to be willing to teach and to learn. Pilsdon asks each of us to lift up our heads from our tasks and to invite others to join us in what we are doing; teaching and learning.

We are trying to learn love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

My guess is that for hard work to have virtue, it must in some way build us towards these traits; to teach us how to receive a gift greater than our own egos or habits. Pilsdon is a place of great beauty and abundance and a place of hard work and a place of transformation. And we ask each and every one of you to help us in that work with your prayers and with your love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol.
