I arrived at Heathrow Airport on the 30th of June, enthused by what awaited me for the coming year. A two-month whirlwind trip around Europe and Egypt proved as exciting as I had expected. I then prepared myself to return to the classroom. A teacher for the past 5 years in New Zealand I had sought a year's unpaid leave to (among other things) see if the UK could provide a more sustainable and supportive environment for its



educators. After three weeks in the job, it appeared not. So it was that I began the tiring grind of seeking new employment.

Application after application was sent out. Nothing seemed to stick. It was during this period of uncertainty that I found myself watching a television program about "working holidays" spent in communities around the UK. I was intrigued enough to run a quick Google search where I became aware of Pilsdon. To cut a long story short, I have now been volunteering at Pilsdon for a month and have found the experience to be more rewarding than I had anticipated. A much-welcomed change of pace.

The most significant change is of course the type of work. Coming from directly dealing with 300 teenagers every day, to a quiet, rural community, with less than 25 people at the peak of social engagements, is quite the contrast. This difference however is what gives the Pilsdon Community its charm, especially for an overstimulated educator. The work may at times be taxing, but it is rewarding and spiritually enriching, and the food is some of the best I have ever tasted! Being able to work with the livestock as well as the development of new skills has meant that this change of pace is just what the doctor ordered.

The welcome one receives upon arrival is warm and, it would seem, everpresent, perhaps alluding to the real foundation of the place - its people. I have felt quite at home, owing to the genuine nature of acceptance and patience. I look forward to the rest of my stay at Pilsdon and encourage anyone thinking of volunteering to apply – you won't regret it.
